The applicant proposes to construct a dam on Portions 3 and 5 of the farm Van der Wattskraal 394 for the irrigation of a variety of nuts cultivated as part of a Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment (BBBEE) project. The water will be abstracted from a natural watercourse at the Eksteenskloof weir located on the adjacent property (remaining extent of Farm 234), and piped to the dam during winter only.

The Eksteenskloof weir requires reconstruction following a flood event in 2008, which will be rebuilt to a maximum height of $\pm 2,2m$, a total length in the order of $\pm 35m$ and a top width of $\pm 300mm$, on a 3,6m wide foundation. The proposed dam will involve the construction of a zoned earth fill dam with a gross capacity in the order of $\pm 330\,000m3$ including an open channel spillway and piped outlet works. The embankment will have a maximum height of $\pm 14m$, a total length in the order of $\pm 519m$ and a crest width of $\pm 4m$. The bulk of the embankment earth fill would come from inside the dam basin below the full supply level.

A new pipeline, approximately 300 - 350 metres in length and 300 mm in diameter, will be constructed to feed water from the weir to the storage dam. The pipeline, with construction footprint of 5 metres, will have a total footprint of ± 0.175 ha.

Describe elements in the environs of the site that could be deemed to be heritage resources: The applicant proposes to construct a dam and rebuild a weir on Portions 3 and 5 of the farm Van der Wattskraal 394, and Remainder of Farm 234, to provide irrigation to nut orchards to be planted as part of a BBBEE project in the Swellendam Municipality, Overberg District, Western Cape.

The presence of perennial water in this area has meant that it has been occupied since the Stone Age, first by hunter-gatherers, and, more recently, by pastoralists. The VOC began loaning land to farmers in this region in the 1700s, and it became increasingly intensively farmed for stock and, particularly wheat. The site lies 15 km east of Riviersonderend and 46 km west of Swellendam, in the heart of this wheat growing region. There are currently accommodation and conference facilities on the farm. The watercourse in which the repair of the weir is required has been indicated as a floodplain wetland within a moderately modified condition, according to the National Freshwater Ecosystems (NFEPA) database (2011), however the proposed development area has not been identified as wetland habitat, nor a River Freshwater Ecosystem Priority Area (FEPA).

There are no declared heritage sites within a 15km radius of the proposed development site, although four graded sites exist (Figure 3 and Appendix 1). These are a Grade IIIc historic farmhouse (VRY-RIV01, SID 44099), and three archaeological sites containing ESA and MSA material. One of these, graded IIIb (RSV2, SID 44105), is an extensive scatter of predominantly Early Stone Age material with some Middle Stone Age artefacts included. One of the Grade IIIc sites (RSV1, SID 44104), is a disturbed site comprising Middle and Early Stone Age artefacts, while the other (PMLT7. SID 19383) contains scattered ESA and MSA material. Five heritage surveys have been conducted in the area (Figure 2 and Appendix 2), comprising four AIAs and an HIA. These reports confirm that the region has been inhabited since the Stone Age, and occupied more recently by the Khoekhoe, while farms were granted to Europeans from the eighteenth century onwards (Deacon 2006, NID 4731). The early farming of the area has intensified and diversified to create the cultural landscape as it exists today. Relatively little artefactual material was found in these surveys (sites RSV1 and 2 and PMLT7), likely owing to the long term disturbance of surfaces resulting from intensive cultivation (Kaplan 1990, NID 7807). The only report conducted on relatively undisturbed ground (Kaplan 2004, NID 4634) also found relatively little material - nine artefacts over a 10 ha area. These occurrences all fell outside the 15km radius of consideration in this application, but serve to show the relative paucity of artefactual material in this region; more artefactual material and sites should be expected in caves and shelters in more mountainous regions.

In terms of the palaeontology of the study area, the underlying deposits are of low fossil sensitivity, comprising scree, talus and alluvium as well as light grey to red sandy soils. The proposed developments will, therefore, have no impact on significant palaeontological resources.

Description of impacts on heritage resources in the environs of the site: While it is clear that archaeological material does occur in this region, the combination of long term disturbance of surfaces through intensive cultivation, and the apparent infrequency of artefactual material found on open ground, makes any discovery of in situ, significant archaeological heritage resources unlikely. The proposed development will have no negative impact on the cultural landscape.

In light of the above, it is unlikely that the proposed development will impact on significant heritage resources and as such, it is recommended that no further heritage studies are required._____
