

AMENDED SITE SENSITIVITY VERIFICATION (“SSV”) REPORT: PROPOSED PROSPECTING FOR ALLUVIAL DIAMONDS WITH BULK SAMPLING ON A TOTAL AREA OF APPROXIMATELY 121HA ON A PORTION OF PORTION 4 RIETFONTEIN EXTENSION 151 AND A PORTION OF PORTION 4 GRAAUW DUINEN 152, VANRHYNSDORP (WC 50/1/1/2/10454/ PR)

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INTRODUCTION:

This SSV Report was undertaken in terms of the *Protocols for the Assessment and Minimum Criteria for Reporting on identified Environmental Themes* (hereinafter referred to as “the Protocols”) as per Government Notice No. 320 (published in Government Gazette No. 43110 on 20 March 2020)¹. These Protocols, with effect from 09 May 2020 must be complied with for every new application submitted on the effective date and thereafter. According to the Protocols, the Environmental Assessment Practitioner (“EAP”) must verify the current use of the proposed

site for development as well as the environmental sensitivity of the proposed site in terms of the Screening Tool to determine the need for specialist inputs in relation to the Themes (and proposed specialist assessments) included in the Protocols.

METHODOLOGY:

The SSV Report was compiled using desktop studies [that include using the web-based Screening Tool and GoogleEarth) to investigate, identify, and evaluate the potential environmental impacts of the proposed alluvial diamonds prospecting and bulk sampling of an approximate total of 121ha between the low-water and high-water mark of the sea on Portion 4 of the Farm Rietfontein Extension No 151 and Portion 4 of the Farm Graauw Duinen No. 152, Vanrhynsdorp. The SSV Report was compiled by the EAP (Mr. Bernard de Witt).

AIM OF THE SSV REPORT:

The aim of the SSV Report is to;

- Verify land use and Theme sensitivities as identified by the DEA Screening Tool;
- Confirm whether or not the need exists for the specialist assessment(s) indicated in the Screening Tool Report; and
- Should the need for a specialist assessment be disputed, provide motivation as to why the proposed specialist assessment is unwarranted for the proposed development.

This will assist in providing a good understanding of the situation prevailing on the proposed site.

SITE DESCRIPTION:

The proposed site is an undeveloped strip of land that is located between the low-water and the high-water mark of the sea on Portion 4 of the Farm Rietfontein Extension No. 151 and Portion 4 of the Farm Graauw Duinen No. 152, Vanrhynsdorp. The said properties are zoned Agriculture, but no agricultural activity takes place thereon. The proposed site is mainly informally by for camping during the crayfish season and for kelp collection. A two-lane farm track on the proposed site exists that connects to the N7 National Road and the R363 Regional Road..

6	Defence	Low	Confirm	The EAP is of the opinion that the Screening Tool has given an inaccurate sensitivity rating of Very high for the Defence Theme, as the proposed site is undeveloped coastal land with no features of any defence significance. The EAP is therefore of the view that the correct sensitivity rating for the Defence Theme is negligible.
7	Palaeontology	Very high	Confirm	The proposed development will change the character of the more than 5000m ² proposed site and in accordance with the National Heritage Resources Act, a heritage impact specialist will be appointed to conduct an on-site palaeontological impact study.

2	Archaeological and Cultural Heritage	The proposed development will change the character of the approximately 44ha proposed site and in accordance with the National Heritage Resources Act, this requires that a heritage impact specialist has been appointed to conduct an on-site archaeological and cultural heritage assessment. The specialist has therefore been appointed.
3	Palaeontological Impact Assessment	The proposed development will change the character of the approximately 121ha proposed site and in accordance with the National Heritage Resources Act, this requires that a heritage impact specialist has been appointed to conduct an on-site palaeontological impact assessment. The specialist has therefore been appointed.
4	Terrestrial Biodiversity Assessment	A specialist will be appointed to conduct the Terrestrial Biodiversity Assessment
5	Aquatic Biodiversity Impact Assessment	The proposed prospecting and bulk sampling will remain at least 600m back from the wetlands of the Sout River that may otherwise be affected by the proposed prospecting and bulk sampling. An aquatic biodiversity specialist will therefore not be appointed to conduct an aquatic biodiversity specialist investigation.
6	Marine Impact Assessment	A specialist will be appointed if the State Departments and Organs of State that administer laws relating to the seashore deem it that a Marine Impact Assessment is required for the proposed development.
7	Hydrology Impact Assessment	An aquatic biodiversity specialist will be appointed to conduct a specialist investigation that includes inter alia, the potential hydrological impacts of the proposed prospecting with bulk sampling. A separate Hydrological Impact Assessment will not be conducted.
8	Plant Species Assessment	A specialist will be appointed to conduct a Terrestrial Biodiversity Assessment and the assessment will include the Plant Species Theme. A separate assessment of the Plant Species Theme is unwarranted and is not going to be conducted.
9	Animal Species Theme	A specialist will be appointed to conduct a Terrestrial Biodiversity Assessment and the assessment will include the Animal Species Theme. A separate assessment of the Animal Species Theme is unwarranted and is not going to be conducted.
10	Socio-economic Impact Assessment	The proposed prospecting with bulk sampling is small and short-lived and can therefore not cause any significant positive nor negative socio-economic impacts. It is only if the results of the proposed prospecting with bulk sampling warrant the establishment of a mine on the proposed site and a mining application is lodged that a Socio-economic Assessment would be warranted. A specialist will not be appointed for the proposed prospecting with bulk sampling.

All the Specialist Assessments and Compliance Statements compiled by specialists and the written opinions of other suitably qualified professionals will be appended to the Environmental Impact Report and submitted to the competent authority for review.
